The Reverend Sharon Salomons - Interim Priest in Charge

As you read this, we will have entered into the liturgical season of Lent. I grew up in a nonliturgical tradition that did not acknowledge Lent so when I became an Anglican I found myself especially drawn to this season. An opportunity for a time of quietness and prayer, a time of deeper reflection on what it means to follow in the way of Christ. I learned also that Lent was a time to particularly focus on the suffering of Jesus. I don't believe this makes the season "a downer" although I do know of some who avoid Holy Week and Good Friday because they see it that way. Lent invites us not to shy away from, or avoid the suffering of Jesus, of our own lives and in our world, but to face the darkness with courage and supported by the sustaining love of Jesus. And that in this process we learn to trust in a deeper way that the darkness does not overcome us, but that through it, we find the path of new life. I commend to you the opportunities in our parish to invite you into this kind of deeper reflection this Lent which you will find described elsewhere in this newsletter.

This season of Lent continues to be a time of transition for our parish. Please continue prayers for the canonical committee as they work with the bishop in seeking a successful appointment in the near future. Please also continue to keep the Reverend Keith Gilbert in your prayers during his leave of absence.

North Van Deanery Lenten Book Study 2018 Phil Sunderland

"The Great Spiritual Migration - How the World's Greatest Religion is Seeking a Better Way to Be Christian" Brian D. McLaren, Convergent Books, 2016

Monday evenings beginning February 26th at St. Catherine's Church. 7:00 p.m.

Brian McLaren, was formerly a member of the Plymouth Brethren Church, a conservative denomination. Since then, has progressed through the evangelical arm of our communion, and is now identified by his former friends as a quote, progressive".

McLaren's latest book, 'The Great Spiritual Migration', explores ways in which our faith may be revitalized, and refocused on living well in this life and world, rather than focusing on what may be the life beyond.

The study will take four 1 ½ hour sessions, which will include a brief introduction, a roughly 15 minute video showing McLaren interacting with other concerned people, then a discussion of the week's reading in reference to a number of Scripture passages.

Episcopal Diocese of Northern Philippines. - Tony Dodd

An informal meeting was held at the Synod office on Saturday January 20th at 9:30 am with liaisons with the Episcopal Diocese of Northern Philippines.

As I am the representative for St. Catherines, I attended with 30 others from 21 different parishes. It was an open discussion on connecting with a partner parish in the Episcopal Diocese of North Philippines. There is additional information on the Diocese website on the EDNP.

Our partner in the Philippines is St. Catherine of Sienna Mission, Cavantes, under Jerry Sagayo, whom I will be corresponding with in the next few weeks. . I have had numerous emails from the EDNP and am impressed with their development in the community

Property Development Task Force Update

During the Annual Vestry Meeting on Sunday, February 25th, John Luccock and I gave a short presentation to update the Parish with the information that we shared with both A & F (Administration & Finance) and Parish Council in early December:

- High level overview of Simon Lemare's report on the estimated cost of bringing all of our structures (Church, Gym and Rectory) up to current building code
- Overview of the five options/next steps that Simon included in his report
- Review of the 'proof of concept' (feasibility study) provided by Marcon Developments Ltd. near the end of October
- Information regarding the Nanaimo Ecumenical Society, which serves as an excellent example of the many parishes across the country actively involved in an agreement whereby they share/co-habitat with a common set of Church buildings. The intent of our presentation was to provide the Parish with some key information prior to the Parish Town Hall 'Property Development' Meeting scheduled immediately following the 9:30 am worship service on Sunday, April 15th. PWRDF and Foodgrains Bank: 'Together we are Strong'

Member agencies of the Foodgrains Bank respond to global hunger crises, but they also respond to other global issues like health care and education.

One benefit is how the work of the Foodgrains Bank is focused on food aid, food security and nutrition. The Foodgrains Bank is able to provide that expertise.

It was the combination of working together alongside other Christian denominations and of having expertise on food security that ultimately led PWRDF to join the Foodgrains Bank in 2007. Today, their commitment to the partnership remains strong.

A farmer named Jane Wanjiku in Kenya, learned new ways of farming through an agriculture project funded by the Foodgrains Bank. At first, Jane's neighbours teased her about adopting these new farming techniques because they were different than the traditional techniques common in her community. Despite this, Jane's crops were successful.

Jane noticed that her neighbours were watching the techniques she was using, and that opened up the conversation for her to share her techniques with others.

Not only had Jane learned more efficient farming practices to better provide for her family, but she was sharing that knowledge with others in the community as well, giving them an opportunity to benefit from the Foodgrains Bank-funded project.

That's where the partnerships with local groups and members like PWRDF are so critically important because we can make a difference and inspire communities overseas to work together.
