# Message from our Vicar - The Rev. Dr. Sharon Smith

To the Saint Catherine's Community,

I was dazzled by my experience of Epiphany, among you. A season of sharing ideas and giving voice to our dreams; and hearing about journeys of faith, while being invited to reflect on my own.

And then we entered Lent. It felt like a thud. And with the seasonal change, we seemed to be overwhelmed by suffering in the lives of our families, our friends, our neighbours and our world. Nothing prepares us for this. And only God can sustain us.

This prayer by Mrs. Gretchen Olheiser expresses it so well:

Stepping from the brightness of Epiphany
I enter an unfamiliar place called "Lent."
My eyes are slow to adjust to the change.
I blink back tears and stand still wondering if my eyes are open or closed,
For nothing visible lies before me.

My senses tell me there are objects ahead-Prized places, sacred spaces. There is no sense of urgency; Time has fallen away leaving forty days and forty nights To explore this unknown, yet somehow familiar place; Touching, feeling, knowing holy moments.

# Message from the People's Warden regarding the Property Development Initiative - Gordon Lee

In my conversations with Diocesan officials about Diocesan support for parish property development initiatives over the past year, here's what I have learned:

The Diocese may provide financial support to parishes for their proposed capital projects based on the following criteria:

The Parish has developed clear project goals that if implemented successfully will enhance its continuing ministry.

- o The Parish is committed to the capital project and has demonstrated this by:
- o Putting in place strong lay leadership; and,
- Raising monies to support the planned project.
- The Parish has made a major financial commitment and has exhausted its ability to complete the project because of unforeseen cost overruns.
- The project is not self-financing i.e. the proceeds from property development will not cover project costs.
- Fairness Diocesan support should be consistent with financial contributions made to other parishes.

St. Catherine's Vestry proposed development, is envisioned as self-supporting. It also includes provision to create an endowment for the parish. Therefore, the Diocese might consider providing a small grant to the Parish to assist it in appointing and retaining a Special Consultant, Project Manager, or recognized company to research the key aspects of property development. In addition, the Diocese might be prepared to receive a proposal from the Parish for a loan to cover some of this cost. We understand that Diocesan Approval would be based on the parish providing a clear set of project goals that if implemented will enhance the parish's continuing ministry. We are asked to provide evidence demonstrating St. Catherine's commitment to this capital project. Discussions are ongoing.

### Long, Long Night of Hope - Brenda Stenson

On February 23, 2019, Heather Peacock and I slept in a car in the parking lot at St. John's Anglican Church on the corner of 13<sup>th</sup> Street and Chesterfield Avenue. We did this to raise awareness and understanding of the growing homelessness crisis in our community.

It was a humbling night. I slept for not more than about an hour at a time. It was cold, cramped and creepy. I woke up in the morning stiff, sore, weary and just glad to see the light of day. I also woke up with a deep sense of gratitude. Gratitude for a warm home, for people who love and support me (and would welcome me into their warm home if I needed) and for an abundance of the basic needs.

I got out of the car and was able to enjoy a cup of hot coffee with friends. I could go home and have a shower, dress in clean clothes and I knew I would be able to sleep in my own warm, comfortable bed that night.

Hundreds of people are not that lucky. Many don't have cars and struggle to find a small spot away from the elements. If they are able to find somewhere to sleep, what will they face in the morning? I imagine another struggle – finding food, keeping dry, keeping some sense of hope.

At the time of writing this, fifteen people participating in The Long, Long Night of Hope have raised \$18,955.00. This will assist in the hiring of Outreach Workers who work with each individual to ensure they receive necessary support. The North Shore team provides "deep woods" services as many of their guests live in local ravines and forests, often resistant to moving from their camps into a shelter or housing.

# Living a Life of Faith – Heather Luccock

During the Season of Epiphany the theme was Living a Life of Faith. It followed along from the Advent sessions that were held for three weeks before Christmas. On February 9 twenty people gathered to reflect on what it means to live a life of faith through participating in a prayer workshop facilitated by Rev. Sharon Salomons and Heather Luccock. We explored several prayer practices that might assist us in a meaningful prayer life – praying with a rosary; icons, centering prayer, Benedictine spirituality, practicing the presence of God, to name a few.

This theme continued on the Sundays during Epiphany and into Lent when Rev. Sharon asked various parishioners if they would share their experience of living a life of faith. The Rev. Anne Crosthwait, a new member, Lynn Spence, Heather Peacock and Brenda Stenson together, Pip Stigger, Sheila Baldock (read by Nancy Sunderland) Gary Stewart, Alison Watt, and our own Rev. Sharon gave very moving accounts of their spiritual journeys.

Beginning in Lent a Reflective Corner of the Nave (beside the pulpit) has been set up featuring works of art – photography, paintings, and fabric art to reflect the Lenten topic of the week.

Thanks to Sheila Baldock, Nicole Geha, Janet Johnson, Heather Luccock, Vivian McGie, Janet Morris, Lynn Spence, Nancy Sunderland, Rev. Sharon and Joy Wee for their contributions.

Part of the display is a beautiful large glass bowl with a whale design etched on the bottom. It has been donated to us by Kelsey, daughter of Jacqui Smart, who is a new parishioner. This large kiln-formed bowl was made years ago from a custom mold. It was crafted by a team of incredible artists, under the supervision of multi-discipline artist and Lower Mainland resident, David Danchuk.

It is one of a series of such bowls, some of which have been sold at a considerable amount and some have been commissioned as baptismal fonts. The bowl's dimensions minus the stand are: diameter 39", height 7" from the ground. When David was diagnosed with leukemia, he and his family sold many pieces from his vast portfolio of artwork to raise money. When David put the word out Kelsey was keen to view the art Dave had put for sale, and she immediately loved this spectacular piece. Kelsey enjoyed the bowl as a striking conversation piece for some years but she would now love to see it go on to a church. It can perhaps, be enjoyed by many families in their children's baptism ceremonies. Thank you, Kelsey.

The Annual Pancake Supper on Shrove (Pancake) Tuesday attracted the largest crowd in the last few years. About 150 enjoyed the supper consisting of pancakes, sausages, ice cream, cookies, juice along with coffee and tea. It was a joy to see the great mix of adults and children. Our thanks to Marion Porter, our Supervisor of Pre School, who prepared a craft for the children. Our thanks also to the 15 volunteers from the Parish, who made the evening possible.

Mr. Peter Goodwin, chair of the Primates World Relief and Development Fund for the Diocese, was in attendance. He provided a wonderful display of the on going work of PWRDF. After expenses some \$300.00 was forwarded to the PWRDF.



It has now been 60 years since The Primate's World Relief & Development Fund was established in Canada by the Anglican Church. It was started in 1958 to assist the town of Springhill, Nova Scotia in supporting families who had been affected, when a mine explosion killed some 75 miners.

PWRDF has come to see that deeper, long-term development needs are strongly connected to suffering caused by natural or human-provoked disasters. Even more significantly, PWRDF realized that people who experience these problems first-hand are in the best position to develop long-term solutions. It has been the position of PWRDF to identify those needs and give Anglicans the opportunity to support these causes.

From the beginning, St. Catherine's parishioners have supported the PWRDF along with other Outreach programs. We have always had a Parish Representative to the Diocesan wing of PWRDF. I well remember the work of those past representatives in our Parish. Ted Alexander, Hannah Brookfield, and Lil Thirkell come to mind. It has been my privilege to be your Parish Rep since 2004. It is time to appoint a new Parish Representative. I am pleased to say that Parish Council has appointed Monica MacDonald. Monica has been a life long member of St. Catherine's and served many roles in the life of the Parish, not the least , being the Rector's/Bishop's Warden in the recent past.

I wish Monica well and trust she will find this role both challenging and fulfilling.
