The Proclamation of the Word

First Reading: Meditations with Julian of Norwhich

I saw that God was everything that is good and encouraging.

God is our clothing that wraps, clasps, and encloses us so as never to leave us.

God showed me in my palm a little thing round as a ball about the size of a hazelnut.

I looked at it with the eye of my understanding and asked myself

"What is this thing"?

And I was answered "It is everything that is created"

I wondered how it could survive since it seemed so little it could suddenly disintegrate into nothing.

The answer came: "it endures and even will endure" because God loves it"

And so everything has being because of God's love.

Reader: Let us hear what the Spirit is saying.

All: Thanks be to God.

Psalm 105

Refrain is sung by a cantor, Verses are said by cantor and congregation alternating.

Refrain (sung by the cantor)

O Lord, still guide us on our way;

Be our hope and stay.

Cantor: Give thanks to the Lord and call God's name aloud.

Tell all the people what God has done. The Lord is our God.

God will keep the covenant made with Abraham and the promise given to Isaac and Jacob.

The covenant was a promise to Israel that the land of Canaan would become their inheritance (*Refrain*)

People: God sent a famine against the land and cut off all food supply.

Joseph was sold as a slave and imprisoned in Egypt.

Then the king released him and put him in charge of his household.

Israel came to Egypt and the Lord made them stronger than their oppressors. (Refrain)

Cantor: God sent Moses and Aaron, who performed miracles in Egypt.

Moses brought Israel out and none of the people faltered.

There was sent a cloud for a covering by day and fire to give them light by night. (Refrain)

All: God fed them food from heaven and opened a rock, and water gushed out.
God's holy promise to Abraham was kept.
Israel was given lands where others had lived on the condition
that they would keep God's commands. Praise the Lord!

Second Reading: Romans 14:1-12

Paul writes to the Philippians from prison. Though he is uncertain about the outcome of his imprisonment, he calls on the Philippians to live lives that reflect the gospel.

For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain. If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which I prefer. I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better; but to remain in the flesh is more necessary for you. Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, so that I may share abundantly in your boasting in Christ Jesus when I come to you again.

Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of

the gospel, and are in no way intimidated by your opponents. For them this is evidence of their destruction, but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ, but of suffering for him as well—since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

Reader: Let us hear what the Spirit is saying.

All: Thanks be to God.

Gospel Hymn

Gospel Reading: Matthew 18:21-35

Jesus tells a parable about God's generosity, challenging the common assumption that God rewards people according to what they have earned or deserve.

Presider: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Presider: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ

according to Matthew

People: Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.'

So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them egual to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So, the last will be first, and the first will be last."

Presider: The Gospel of Christ.

People: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Presider: Among friends, gathered round a table, Jesus

In the same way he took wine, and having given thanks for it, he poured it out and gave it to his disciples, saying: "This cup is the new relationship with God, sealed with my blood. Take this and share it. I shall drink wine with you next in the coming Kingdom of God.

We take this bread and this wine; The ordinary things of the world, through which God will bless us.

And as Jesus offered thanks for the gifts

of the earth, let us also celebrate

God's goodness.

Presider: Lord Jesus Christ,

All: Present with us now,

as we do in this place what you did in an

upstairs room,

breathe your Spirit upon us and upon this

bread and this wine.

That they may be heaven's food and

drink for us,

renewing, sustaining and making

us whole,

and that we may be your body on earth, loving and caring in the world. Amen.

Presider: And now as our Saviour taught us, let us pray

in the language of our hearts:

hallowed be your name.

Your kingdom come, your will be done

on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins

As we forgive those who sin against us.

While the communion is being administered, we respectfully ask that you keep the silence.


